## Summer Seminar Scholarships Available for 2023 Annual Event

The American Numismatic Association (ANA) is accepting scholarship applications for its 2023 Summer Seminar, the hobby's premier educational event. Recipients will have the opportunity to attend one of two weeklong sessions, to be held June 17-22 and June 24-29 on the Colorado College campus adjacent to ANA headquarters in Colorado Springs, Colorado. All members – both adults and young numismatists (YNs) – are eligible.

YNs can apply for financial aid through the <u>ANA</u> Young Numismatist Scholarship program. Applicants must be full-time students, age 13-17. Adults 18 and older can receive full or partial assistance through the <u>Robert C. Lecce Advanced Scholarship</u> Program. The <u>Charles O. Browne Scholarship</u> is available for applicants, age 15-25, attending the Advanced United States Coin Grading and Problem Coins class offered during session 2. Two additional scholarships will be announced soon.

Full scholarships for both YNs and adults include room and board for one week, tuition, and airfare, while partial scholarships for all applicants cover tuition only. Recipients will be selected based on need and merit.

And on Sept. 10 at the Ontario Numismatic Association's Annual Convention club delegate's breakfast, it was announced that the Nashua Coin Club had won the ONA Club of the Year Award for the second year in a row.

And our director, Bob Fritsch, was surprised by an award that he received at the Royal Canadian Numismatic Association Convention. Bob has been named a "Fellow of the RCNA" because of all the hard work and dedication that he has poured into our hobby and into that organization as a speaker, exhibitor, judge, among many other activities he has taken on through the years, Congratulations, Robert Fritsch, FRCNA!

We are immensely proud of our accomplishments as a club but the most important and relevant point to make about these awards is that many members of the club participated in the activities and challenging work that went into making these things possible. We are truly a fortunate organization to have so many talented individuals willing and able to spend the time and resources necessary to be a great coin club.

Our July meeting was held at Nashua Public Library and via Zoom. There were 23 members and guests in attendance between the two venues.

Two new members attended the July meeting. Welcome to the Nashua Coin Club, Dave Wrocklage and Bob Rissolo!

Our 'coin of the month' was any numismatic item from anywhere in the world which had a mint or engraving error. We saw a collection of large cents with overdates, wrong number of stars and the word Liberty misspelled as "Liherty." There was a gold Roman coin with the monarch's name misspelled as Crolus instead of Carolus. There were Canadian \$2 Toonies with a major die crack through both metals on these bimetallic coins. There were also plenty of Lincolns and pocketchange coinage with minor errors that had been gleaned from circulation. It was a popular topic with participation from almost everyone.

The show-and-tell portion of the July meeting was also well represented. Kevin Winn passed around his 2023 "Red Book" which he had signed by Jeff and Mary Lynn Garrett, Ken Bressett, and Kim Kiick. Joe Casazza showed off a necklace of turn-of-the-century coins, and Ray Dionne passed around some recently acquired Morgan Dollars, just to name a few of the highlights.

The August meeting was held at the library and via Zoom. We had a total of 24 attendees between the two venues. In new business, we chose our menu for the upcoming NCC awards banquet on Oct. 10, and we also conducted a secret ballot to choose the award winners for 2022.

It was also announced that the Nashua Coin Club has joined two more organizations as a member club. We are now a member club of Early American Coppers (EAC) and the Royal Canadian Numismatic Association (RCNA). Thanks to Tim Skinski and Kevin Winn for donating the first year of the EAC membership and to Director Bob Fritsch, for donating a two-year membership in the RCNA. Besides those two clubs, the Nashua Coin Club is also a member of the American Numismatic Association (ANA), the New England Numismatic Association (NENA), the Central States Numismatic Society (CSNS), and the National Coin and Bullion Association (NCBA).

Our 'coin of the month' for August was any numismatic item which has been converted or is being used for a different purpose than that for which it was designed. We saw a number of coin-related items being used for paperweights, swagger sticks, wine bottle stoppers, and various types of jewelry. There were also dollar bills turned into origami figures, elongated cents used as souvenirs, counterstamped coins used as advertisements, and even a five-franc French coin which had been transformed into a pocketknife with a nail file and a blade. It was a surprisingly robust topic with almost everyone taking part.

Show-and-tell is always filled with interesting items and August was no exception. Tom M. started us off with an uncut sheet of 32 \$1 bills which he saved from being shredded by a friend who thought that it would be too much trouble to separate them so they could be spent! Cliff L. had a commemorative coin honoring all Purple Heart recipients, one of the few coins ever colorized by the U.S. Mint. Fred L. related a remarkable story about the ANA Summer Seminar which he attended in June in Colorado Springs. It turned out that the instructor for the Roman Provincial

Coinage course that he took was the very same person who functioned as a tour guide when Fred visited Italy thirteen years earlier. It took a while to figure out, but Fred has a good memory for faces and a conversation with the instructor, Dr. Lucia Carbone, confirmed the coincidence.

Our September meeting was held on the 14<sup>th</sup> in the library and on Zoom. Twenty-four members and guests participated between the two venues.

In old business, we made final preparations for the October awards banquet, and we also talked about the proposal to purchase a computer, software, and peripheral equipment for the club. This would make it easier to run our hybrid meetings on Zoom and also would be used by the club secretary to keep all information, history, and correspondence from/to the club in one central location.

Our 'coin of the month' for September was Memorial Coins and Medals from any country and any era. Kevin W. passed around a hobo-style coin which he received at the ANA Summer Seminar in June. It was a depiction of Daniel "Tiny" Cross who was an important fixture at the Summer Seminar for many years and who sadly passed away in 2020. We saw other coins memorializing various rulers like Napoleon, British royalty, American presidents, and a medal which commemorated the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of a fire which destroyed a city in Switzerland.

Show-and-tell for September was highlighted by two coins brought in by Gary G., a former NCC president and the owner of Nashua Coins and Collectibles. He showed an 1886 \$3 gold coin in a PCGS PR65 holder, and a 1900 \$20 gold coin in a PCGS PR60 holder. The mintage on these two coins was 142 and 124 respectively, and Gary has the coins on consignment so that he can sell them via a sealed bid process. They could be worth as much as \$50,000 between the two coins. Matt M. passed around a bicentennial quarter with strong doubling in the legends that he gleaned from a roll of quarters from the bank. And Bob F. showed off his two-ounce silver five-pound "Lion of England" coin which he won in a raffle at the Ontario Numismatic Association Annual Convention earlier in the month.

Our upcoming 'coin of the month' topics have been selected:

November – Occupation circulation money from any country, any war.

January – Nickels of the world or nickel-sized coins.

February – Numismatic items with boats, ships, and/or flags on them.

March – How do you keep track of your collections?

April – Coins or scrip with images of coins on them.

May – Morgan and Peace Dollars.

June – Numismatics with Animals (extra points for baby animals)!

July – Numismatics with a summer theme, e.g., beaches, ballgames, BBQ's.

There are no coins of the month in October (awards banquet) or December (white elephant auction).

The Pennsylvania Association of Numismatists (PAN) Fall Coin Show and Convention, held Oct. 20-22 at the Monroeville Convention Center, Monroeville, Pa. (a Pittsburgh suburb) was packed with events.


