## Experience a Virtual Reality Tour at the Money Museum

*Discover the British Empire's History Through Interactive Online Tour*

Museum enthusiasts, history aficionados and coin collectors can explore the American Numismatic Association's Money Museum exhibit, "Money of Empire: Elizabeth to Elizabeth," in a new 360-degree virtual reality tour that can be viewed from a computer or a VR headset. Visitors can experience close-up images of many of the exhibit's objects, allowing views from both sides of the pieces on display and details that are not visible in person.

"Money of Empire," uses money and medals to illustrate the development of the British Empire from its beginnings under Elizabeth I (1558-1603) to the present day. The British Empire, more than any other, set the stage for the modern world in which we live. From small origins during the late 16th century, the Empire expanded to become the largest empire in history and the most powerful global economic and military power for over a century.

The Money Museum also is home to the Harry W. Bass Jr. Collection, one of the greatest U.S. gold coin collections ever assembled. The Bass holdings feature the only complete collection of \$3 gold pieces, a complete collection of early U.S. gold coin types of all designs from 1795 to 1933 and more.

The evolution of money through time can be seen in the museum's "History of Money" exhibit as well. Beginning in Mesopotamia and Egypt around 4,500 years ago, gold and silver began to be traded in the form of metal bars or bits of wire. Since then, money has been exchanged in the form of coins, paper money, tokens, emergency money and more.

Other virtual exhibits at the museum feature the 1943 and 1944 cents, the King of U.S. Coins, the "Nickel that Never Was," and the first coinage of the United States Mint.

## 2020 World's Fair of Money® Officially Cancelled

*ANA Board of Governors Commits to Pittsburgh for 2023 Show*

The American Numismatic Association (ANA) Board of Governors voted on July 14 to officially cancel the 2020 World's Fair of Money®. The show was originally scheduled for August 4-8 in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; however, COVID-19 restrictions made continuing with the Pittsburgh event unfeasible, and the Board voted in mind-June to postpone the event while it considered alternate sites and dates. The July 14 vote effectively terminated any further research and planning for a replacement location for the 2020 show given the current coronavirus situation and the inability of the ANA to assure the safety of its members, dealers, staff and visitors.

## 129th ANA Convention Medal Showcases Rachel Carson



Although the 2020 World's Fair of Money® has been cancelled due to COVID-19, the convention medal is being produced regardless.

Retired United States Mint designer, sculptor, engraver Don

Everhart has designed this year's medal, which depicts the bust of Pittsburgh-area born environmentalist and biologist Rachel Carson.

The reverse depicts a Bald Eagle as it swoops down onto the water to snag a trout to bring back to nest to feed her hatchlings. The American Bald Eagle has survived, in part, due to Carson's unwavering efforts to make our natural world more safe and livable.

The medal will be available as a convention medal badge (1.5" bronze medal with a blue ribbon drape) \$22; bronze medal (2.75", numbered) \$65; or as a two-medal set (1.5" bronze medal and 1.5" silver medal, numbered) for \$145.

## National Coordinators of the ANA District & Club Representatives Program

In August 1987, Representatives Program Committee Chairman Bill Fivaz (Georgia) announced the creation of a new Representative volunteer program<sup>1</sup> for the ANA. The Representative Program would be led by the National Coordinator, the top volunteer in the program, who would be responsible for all the District Delegates and Regional Coordinators across the country and in some foreign countries.

The National Coordinator is appointed by the ANA President and must be approved by the Board of Governors. The National Coordinator reports directly to the ANA President, but they work closely with the ANA Club Coordinator and other staff. National Coordinator appointments are for a two-year term (they can be reappointed), but they serve at the pleasure of the ANA President.

Ralph Langham became the first (and longest serving) National Coordinator in June 1988. Eleven people so far have served as National Coordinators. In February 2020, the title of "National Coordinator" was changed by the Board of Governors to "Outreach Programs Coordinator" to better reflect the expansion of the program in 2019.

The first issue of "ANA Newsletter"<sup>2</sup> for the Representative Program started in April 1988. This publication became the *MintMark* publication which continues to be published quarterly by the ANA. The current editor of the *MintMark* is Eric Holcomb (Oregon). She is a life member and past president of the California State Numismatic Association and also holds the honorific title of Emeritus President of the CSNA. As a long time worker at ANA conventions around the country, Dorothy was the general chair of the ANA “Mid-Winter” convention held in San Diego in 1990, and has been recognized by the ANA with the triad of its highest honors. As such, she is a recipient of the ANA’s Glenn Smedley Award, the Medal of Merit, and is the 1995 recipient of the Association’s highest honor, the Farran Zerbe Award. Dorothy is also a Krause Publications Numismatic Ambassador, a singular honor she shares with her son, Larry, and her late husband, Al Baber.

Over the years Dorothy was a member of most of the clubs in San Diego County, including some that no longer exist, and has served as an officer in most of the local clubs at one time or another over the past seven decades. For years she was the medals chair for both the Heartland Coin Club and the San Diego County Inter-Club Numismatic Council, from which she is also a recipient of the council’s Medal of Merit in 1981.

Dorothy served on the U.S. Assay Commission and remained active with the Old Timer Assay Commissioners Society until it disbanded in 2012.

This summary reflects just some of the highlights of her most distinguished career as a volunteer within our hobby.

In recent months, the Heartland Coin Club has not meet in person at Bostonia. President José M.
