

The United States Mint has been making coins for well over 200 years. Coins have had many different designs on both the front (obverse) and back (reverse), from the first copper cent produced all the way back in 1793 to quarters honoring each of the 50 states and territories to medals featuring each U.S. president.

This coloring book shows some of the Mint's coin designs honoring important people, places, and events in U.S. history.

Circulating Coins

Current circulating coins include the penny, nickel, dime, and quarter. You may also use the half dollar and one dollar coin as legal tender, though these coins are less likely to be found in circulation.






You probably recognize some of these coins. You might even have some at home in your piggy bank!





The Obverse and Reverse

The front of a coin is called the obverse. The circulating coin obverses show the faces of famous people, most of them presidents. The back of a coin is called the reverse. The quarter's reverse design changes often.







America the Beautiful Quarters













































Native American \$1 Coins

Native American Dollar Coins honor the achievements of Native Americans throughout history. The image of Sacagawea, the Shoshone who helped Lewis and Clark on their historic voyage of exploration, is on the front (obverse) of the coin. The back (reverse) design changes every year.













Commemorative Coins





50 State Quarters Program

















