Dr. Donald H. Kagin Tiburon, CA LM 724

Don Kagin was born into a numismatic family and began his professional numismatic

career cataloging auctions for his father in 1968. Numismatic education and innovation have been at the forefront of Kagin's career. He attained the nation's first B.A. degree in numismatics at Northwestern University and the first numismatic Ph.D. from the Union Institute and University. Since 1972, many of his research papers have appeared in several professional journals, including *The Journal of Economic History* and *The Numismatist*, where he has won the coveted Heath Literary Award.

Kagin's first book, *Private Gold Coins and Patterns of the United States*, was published in 1981 and is considered the reference book for this series. His other specialties include U.S. paper currency, and his *Numismatist* manuscript, "Treasury Notes of the War of 1812," is considered the definitive work on the subject.

Other innovations include nationally acclaimed one-man shows "The Oldest Living Pioneer" and "Colonial Man," and acting as the academic dean for the University of Rare Coins. Kagin inspired, shepherded and successfully received congressional approval for the 2006 San Francisco Old Mint Centennial Commemorative.

Don has contributed to A Guide Book of United States Coins since the late 1970s and created Currency Market Review, forerunner of Currency Dealer Newsletter. He has received numerous awards for his numismatic service, including the Glenn Smedley Memorial Award, Numismatic and PNG Ambassadors, NSDR Lifetime Achievement and two ANA Presidential Awards.

Kagin is often quoted in national periodicals such as Money, U.S. News and World Report, Barron's and The Wall Street Journal. He has lectured and taught numismatics internationally; conducted seminars and educational forums, including several years at the ANA Summer Seminar; and made several radio and television appearances, including two on Good Morning America and multiple appearances on the History and National Geographic channels.

Besides cataloging, writing, lecturing and teaching numismatics, Kagin is a member of several numismatic clubs and organizations; has served on several academic, educational and numismatic boards; and currently serves as a board member of the Industry Council for Tangible Assets and the National Silver Dollar Roundtable, and as a third-term ANA governor.

During his first term as an ANA governor, Ellsworth served as chairman of the

Development Committee and a member of the Budget and Marketing Committees. He developed and implemented ANA's Philanthropic Gift Acceptance and Fundraising Policies and long-range gifting and fundraising plans. Further, he underwrote the costs for ANA staff to attend major fundraising conferences in Boston, Crested Butte and San Francisco, and personally attended numerous fundraising seminars in Washington, D.C. He has developed and presented educational programs on development at all Board meetings and multiple staff meetings held in Colorado Springs. He has a master's degree in business administration, certificate in international business, bachelor of science in management and bachelor of arts in applied politics.

Colonel Ellsworth is a life member of 17 numismatic associations and has served on many of their boards. He has been a contributor to the "Red Book" since 2002.

His security articles and "Best Secured Coin Shows" have been published extensively in keeping security awareness a priority for collectors and dealers. His personal collecting interests are large cents by Sheldon and Newcomb die variety. He has been a full-time numismatist and dealer as the principal owner of Butternut Coin in Clifton, Virginia, since his retirement from the Pentagon.

If elected, he will continue to develop the long-term gifting and development programs to ensure the ANA and the hobby continue the mission of education and to keep our hobby fun.



Brian Hendelson Bridgewater, NJ LM 3873

The gift of a Morgan silver dollar from his grandmother when he was 10 years old was

the beginning of a nearly 40-year numismatic journey for Brian Hendelson. He saved money from working summer jobs to attend the 1973 ANA show in Boston. Brian has been a passionate collector ever since and today is considered one of the nation's top experts in United States coinage. Brian Hendelson is a familiar face at nearly every numismatic event in the country.

Exhibiting has been an important part of Brian's numismatic efforts for many years. He has created important displays of United States coinage and early Americana for the ANA Museum Showcase. "I enjoy sharing my collection and inspiring others to collect. Working with the ANA to promote numismatic education and its summer convention has been an important part of my relationship with the organization," Hendelson notes. Brian also has experience working with another important nonprofit foundation—George Washington's Mount Vernon residence and museum in Virginia. Many of his important numismatic and early Americana holdings are displayed in that museum.

Brian states, "The future of numismatics should not be taken for granted. We all need to be creative, resourceful and generous with our time to ensure that future generations will have a chance to discover the hobby we all love so much." He plans to utilize his decades of business relationships to bring resources to the ANA to expand the hobby.

Hendelson has plans to introduce a proposal to create and fund numismatic clubs in high schools around the country. "We need to make coin collecting cool for a generation that has been totally distracted by social media and electronic gaming. These people are the future of our hobby, and we need to figure out how to reach them," Hendelson states.

John W. Highfill Broken Arrow, OK LM 2655

John W. Highfill is running for the 2017 American Numismatic Association Board of

Governors. He started collecting Lincoln cents while in the 1st grade in Lawton, Oklahoma, in 1948. This led to a lifetime of numismatics.

In his 40-year career as a professional numismatist, he has always been a supporter of education. John has been an instructor at the Summer Seminars in Colorado Springs, Colorado, for several years and an ANA consultant for three decades.

He is the founder of the National Silver Dollar Roundtable, a nonprofit educational organization founded in 1982. It has become the second-largest numismatic dealer organization in the world. John also understands the convention business. He owned and managed both the National Silver Dollar convention and the National Gold Convention for over 20 years. Both conventions and their seminars were free to the public. His past experience would be very helpful with the ANA bourse conventions.

He is ANA life member #2655, PNG #359, Life member #1 of the NSDR, ICTA board of governors, CCE board of governors, Numismatic Literary Guild, along with up to 20-25 nationwide numismatic organizations. He is also a 25-year contributor to both the "Red Book" and "Blue Book."

As ANA governor, John Highfill will do everything within his power to help the organization continue its educational mission and expand when and where necessary.
