

good friend Bill. Rest in peace Bill as your memory will always be with us. Our sincere sympathies to his family.

The exhibit showed some types of paper money used in Madison County during the Civil War, along with modern coins that commemorate this great historical event that happened 150 years ago.

This exhibit was sponsored by the Madison County Coin Club to celebrate National Coin Week (April 17-23). The MCCC (<http://mccc.anaclubs.org/>) is the largest coin club in the Tennessee Valley. The coin club meets at The Huntsville Senior Center (2200 Drake Ave., SW, Huntsville, AL) on the fourth Monday of every month, except May and December. All meetings begin at 6:30 pm and are free and open to the public.

Florida

FUN Show by Tony Swicer, FUN President and ANA Region 4 Coordinator

The 56th annual Florida United Numismatists (FUN) show, January 6-9, 2011 in Tampa, is now history. We had 585 tables, a new record. There were 219 early bird dealers, 1,559 dealers, and 789 went through photo ID. The public attendance was estimated at 9,600. The Young Numismatist program had 50 and the scout merit badge program had 123. Four coin club buses brought in 141 club members on Saturday. Sales at the Heritage Auction were estimated at \$53 million.

During the opening ceremonies, FUN President Bob Hurst presented FUN Presidential Awards to Bob Brueggeman of Positive Protection, VP Tony Swicer and Board member Tony Bonaro. The Polly Abbott Service Award was presented to Cindy Wibker. The ANA Presidential Award was presented to Jim and Carrie Best by ANA VP Tom Hallenbeck.

FUN membership before the show was about 3,800, with an expected 300-400 new members during the show. The exhibit area had 28 exhibitors from 15 states and Canada. 87 cases were used to exhibit. Best of Show was won by Mack Martin for “Baby Bonds.” The Peoples Choice Award was won by Michael Morrissy for “Tales of a Short Snorter.”

The FUN election results were President - Tony Swicer, VP - Donna Moon, Treasurer - Carrie Best, Secretary - Nancy Casey; Board members Cindy Wibker, Bob Hurst, Gary Overton, Jim Best, Steve Hodges and Ed Abbott. They all serve a two year term.

Most of the 18 educational seminars were very well attended. My program on “Scams, Rip-Offs and Raw Deals to Avoid” had over 60 attendees. Richard Spencer, portraying Ben Franklin, won the ANA Summer Seminar Scholarship. The Charlie Fine Award went to Steve Bieda for his article, “The Controversial Coins from the Land of Fire and Ice,” the 1930 Millennium of the Althing Commemoratives of the Kingdom of Iceland.

The convention center in south downtown Tampa was exceptional. It was right on the water with two major hotels across the street (Marriot and Embassy Suites). Food in the convention center was reasonable. Most dealers said that sales at the show were very good. The 1943 PDS copper cents were on display. The only GSA 1889-CC dollar was available for \$250,000. BU Morgan dollars were hot as well as VF or better type coins. Paper money sold well and I sold many early commemorative fifty cent coins at just back of bid. All of the major grading services were there. Randy Campbell from ICG said it was the busiest show he has ever had, taking in hundreds of coin submissions and giving free verbal grades on coins.

FUN is back in Orlando in 2012 and 2013, but who knows, Tampa could be in the picture again.

A large crowd was on hand for the opening on Friday, April 8 of the 62nd Annual Pacific Northwest Numismatic Association (PNNA) spring convention held April 8-10 at the Tukwila Community Center just outside the city of Seattle, WA for the 11th consecutive year. Billed as the largest coin show in the Northwest, the sold out 90+ table bourse was extremely active from the Friday noon opening until the 4 p.m. close on Sunday.

Bourse Chair, Scott Loos, commented: “We had an opening day record attendance of over 400 between noon and 7 p.m. Both collectors and the public were definitely in hyper-drive buying mode, not just for anything silver, but collector medium grade type coins, tokens, medals, and paper money as well. It’s hard to imagine that circulated silver dimes were trading at around 26 times face!” Silver bullion hit a market high of \$41.26 on Friday.

Show general chairman, Mike Labosier, commented, “the PNNA is the largest collector show in the Pacific Northwest ... and is committed to serving the diverse needs of the hobbyist as well as the all important educational outreach needs of the region. It offers a wide array of free numismatic-learning activities during shows such as: award competitive and interesting top notch collector and club exhibits; a free fun kid’s learning zone and a twelve stop treasure hunt program expertly conducted by ANA Governor Walt Ostromecki; a Boy and Girl Scout coin collecting clinic under the leadership of Assistant Scoutmaster, James Reinders; free public coin collecting basics program for new and non-collectors (adapted from the ANA’s) masterfully taught by PNNA Immediate Past President and long time numismatist, Larry Gaye.”

A wide variety of outstanding Numismatic Theater presentations, under the direction of Gawain O’Conner, took place on Saturday with the keynote forum ‘Before 54’40: Numismatics of the Early Northwest’ given by that renown, well known and enlightening professional numismatic scholar, John Kraljevich. His well-attended program was followed by three other outstanding ones: ‘The Process Involved in Authoring Numismatic Books’ by Rasiel Suarez; ‘Buying and Selling on eBay’ with Eric Holcomb; and lastly ‘Numismatic Photography,’ conducted by Chip Van Gilder. Later that afternoon two coin collector clubs held meetings: The Silver Art Bar Collector’s Club, featuring a talk by Nancy Yee, President, and Buell Ish, of The Colonial Coin Collector’s Club speaking on Massachusetts Silver.

At the PNNA General Membership Meeting, President Lisa Loos thanked the King County Coin Club, the Olympia Coin Club and the Boeing Employees Coin Club for all their time, efforts and donations to the 62nd Convention as ‘co-hosts.’ Lisa Loos was then joined by VP and Awards Chairman, Danny Bisgaard. Kicking off the awards was the recognition of Rick Schulz with a PNNA Presidential Award for his ongoing service as coordinator of the yearly numismatic outreach efforts at the annual Puyallup Fair and organizing and heading the PNNA Club Representative Program. ANA Governor and PNNA member, Walt Ostromecki, who has run the Association’s annual show youth educational activities since 1998 was recognized

for his dedicated service with the Nina Nystrom Memorial Goodwill Ambassador Award. The PNNA's highest and most prestigious honor, the Bob Everett Memorial Award, went to PNNA Secretary and 2011 Tukwila Convention Chairman, Mike Labosier.

South Shore Coin Club by John and Nancy Wilson, ANA National Volunteers


Thank you SSCC for ANA table.

Carson City Coin Collectors of America



Spring 2011 *Curry's Chronicle* targets Carson City coin collectors – The Carson City Coin Collectors of America released its spring 2011 issue of its award-winning journal, *Curry's Chronicle*. In it, president Rusty Goe calls his club “CC” Coin Central. “Our journal consistently offers more information about Carson City coins and related themes than can be found anywhere,” wrote Goe.

In the spring issue of *Curry's Chronicle*, nine writers, three of them first-time contributors, submitted articles covering a variety of topics. Newbie David Reimer presented a thorough coverage of 1875-CC and 1876-CC Trade dollars. Bruce Spence, another first-timer, shared his discoveries in reed counts and Breen varieties on 1876-CC quarters. Mary Elise Arnold-Giambrone became the club's second female writer (Maya Roberts, the first one) with her article that asked the question “What's So Great about Collecting Carson City Coins?”

Weimar W. White, whose articles have appeared in all of the CCCC's first 22 journals, wrote about 1881-CC Morgan silver dollars in Mint State Proof-like condition. Mitchell Yee, the club's resident authority on GSA Carson City dollars, provided sound tips on what to look for when buying unopened boxes of GSA-sale silver dollars. John

Kroon described how he uses gifts, reference books, and field trips to coin shops and coin shows to cultivate an interest in coin collecting in his grandkids. Michael Parrott's article directs readers to the C4OA's website (www.carsoncitycoinclub.com) where, as he explains, participants on the discussion board are 72 coins into a 111-coin project that offers a profile of every date-denomination combination released by the Carson City Mint. In Tom DeFina's article that introduces his popular word search puzzle, he gives a glimpse into the once-thriving Comstock mining camp in Gold Hill, Nevada. Rusty Goe caps off the spring 2011 issue with his 21-page article on the seven denominations dated 1872-CC from the Battle Born collection, the finest complete set of Carson City coins ever assembled.

In addition to acting, Lisa established a film production and distribution company, specializing in television documentaries, industrial training films and public service radio ads. Her projects filmed not only domestically but also internationally, in China, Korea and Taiwan. Her client base included the Department of Defense, the National Rifle Association, UPS and television stars and other celebrities such as Lee Majors, Kareem Abdul Jabbar and Bob Hope. Lisa earned an Emmy nomination as TV producer for an ABC documentary, "All Things Being Equal" and is a current member of the Director Guild of America.

In addition to acting and directing, Lisa was also a freelance photojournalist with feature articles in *Variety* and the *Hollywood Reporter* trade magazine. She has the dubious distinction of being shot by the Russians while a reporter and film technology instructor in Prague, Czechoslovakia in 1968.

But, of all the activities and acclaim that Lisa has earned in her multi-faceted career, she is probably best known for being Las Vegas' first nude showgirl.

Lisa began her career in "old" Vegas and she serves as an unofficial historian of the city's casinos – some long gone, but definitely not forgotten; some still operating but unaware of their proud history. Lisa Medford knows Vegas and the characters who have added to its character!
