The ANA World's Fair of Money 124th anniversary convention was held at the Donald E. Stephens Convention Center, in Rosemont, Ill., Aug. 11-15.

Congratulations to the Chicago Coin Club for hosting their 16th ANA convention, along with Host Chair Jeffrey Rosinia, Honorary Host Chair Harlan Berk and the CCC committee for doing outstanding and dedicated work for this important event. Thanks also to the ANA national volunteers for their continual assistance at all ANA conventions. Convention Director Rhonda Scurek and her team worked hard and kept this large show running smoothly. ANA Executive Director Kim Kiick also is to be commended for all the great work done by the ANA Staff. President Walter Ostromecki and the Board also contributed to the success of this convention. A big thanks to all the dealers for taking tables, the early birds for purchasing badges, along with the show sponsors and patrons for their generous donations in support of the convention.

Farrar, with Nathaniel Bowditch, made a failed attempt to build an observatory at Harvard, something not accomplished until the 1850s. Farrar kept records of weather observations while Hollis Professor, and concluded that a hurricane was a "moving vortex" following the Great Sep-

tember Gale of 1815. Professor Farrar's picture is superimposed over a hurricane symbol, with appropriate annotations. The medals will be produced in two finishes, antique bronze and nickel. Carson City Coin Collectors of America

"Story" and "Community" were on display at the Carson City Coin Collectors of America (CCCCOA) 10-year anniversary regional club meeting in August.

Twenty-five CCCCOA members met in Reno, Nevada on August 22 for the club's regional meeting held at Southgate Coins, which is owned by CCCCOA president Rusty Goe and his wife Marie. Meeting highlights included mini-lectures, a show-and-tell session, and a club fundraising auction.

Club president Rusty Goe opened the meeting by welcoming everyone and asking them to observe two key themes throughout the duration of the get-together: the power of the story, and the need for community in the field of coin collecting.

Following his opening remarks, Goe touched on the first of his themes—the power of the story—and presented attendees with a brief lecture about what he feels are the four essentials of coin collecting: population, grade, price, and story. He told everyone that without coins' stories, collectors are just accumulators of coins—it is one's interest in the stories behind the coins that makes him or her a numismatist. To further illustrate his point, Goe gestured to a display of all 35 issues of the C4OA's award-winning journal, *Curry's Chronicle*, and said "one of the goals of the C4OA has been to encourage members to dig deeper and discover stories behind the coins, and also to share their own personal stories about coin collecting."

Additional presenters and activities included:


- CCCCOA life members Larry and Linda Martin opened the show-and-tell session by sharing about one of their coin collecting achievements: a complete 19-piece Carson City gold half eagle collection, showcased in a glass-topped wooden box. Larry has now completed the entire 57-piece gold coin collection of CC half eagles, eagles, and double eagles.
- Dan McCarty, who presented binders of Nevada ephemera, which included Carson City Mint-related checks and other documents, with many signed by key figures of the period.
- Randy Clifton, who passed out customized ballpoint pens to everyone in attendance as a tongue-in-cheek way of encouraging more people to submit written material to the club's journal. (Now there's an idea!)
- Randy also surprised Maya Jones and Marie Goe with honorary trophies for their efforts in helping Rusty Goe run the club and publish *Curry's Chronicle* through the years.

- At the meeting's midpoint, Goe conducted a brief fundraising auction, with items donated from the membership, including C4OA memorabilia and a handful of CC coins.
- Tony Arnold proudly shared the 103rd coin he acquired recently, an 1871-CC gold double eagle, in his quest to build a complete, 111piece set of Carson City coins.
- Kirk Harris passed around the 1879-CC \$20 gold piece graded PCGS MS-62 that he bought at the famed Battle Born Collection auction in August 2012.
- Mary Elise Arnold invited members to play "Name that Grade." She passed around an NGC-slabbed 1892-CC gold half eagle, with the certificate covered up. While attendees examined it she asked them to write down their best guess as to the grade NGC had assigned it. No one got it exactly right, but some came close to NGC's "AU Details, Rim Damage, Cleaned" assessment.
- Rusty Goe presented another brief lecture, which focused on the theme of community. He expressed his appreciation to everyone who had gathered together for the meeting, especially the ones who traveled the farthest distance to be there.
- Following the meeting, members gathered for an appetizing and sociable dinner at the Claim Jumper restaurant across the street.

The Casino Chip & Gaming Token Collectors Club, Inc.

The Museum of Gaming History, an educational project of the club, is proud to announce a major milestone was reached when the 150,000th casino collectible item, a \$5 Hard Rock Hotel chip from Sioux City, Iowa featuring The King himself, Elvis Presley, was added to the ChipGuide.



The ChipGuide website, www.chipguide.com, is the world's largest casino collectible catalog. All types of casino collectibles are in the ChipGuide, from items used as currency in casinos (chips, tokens, jetons and plaques), to items used to play casino games (dice and cards) to casino advertising (postcards, matchbooks and ashtrays). The ChipGuide is owned by the Museum of Gaming History (MoGH—www.TheMoGH.org), a project of the Casino Chip & Gaming Token Collectors Club, Inc. (CC>CC).

The ChipGuide was developed by CC>CC Hall of Famer Greg Susong to display his personal chip collection. It included chips from Riverboats, Indian Casinos and \$1 chips from Nevada. As the website grew in popularity, he posted scans of chips fellow collectors had but were not in his collection. After Greg's death in October 2009, his family gave the guide to the MoGH, and Charles Kaplan was chosen as the new webmaster. "When I took over," said Charles, "There were 16,500 chips in the ChipGuide. I spent the next 5½ years updating the site, making it easier to add items to the website and expanding it." Besides adding all denominations of chips from around the globe, Charles added many new categories, including Tokens, Matches, Dice, Silver Strikes and Player Club Cards. "After we decided to add more categories to the Chip-Guide, I knew I couldn't do this alone, so I recruited volunteers to help enter all the new submissions." Currently, there are 18 administrators, 54 different categories, 864 different submitters and over 150,000 individual items in the ChipGuide.

In June 2014, Charles was asked to join the MoGH Board of Directors, so he handed the day to day operations to Albert Scalzo. Albert has overseen the addition of more administrators and more categories all while continuing the "path and spirit" of what Greg paved for the ChipGuide.
