Call for Hall of Fame Nominations

The Numismatic Hall of Fame is seeking nominations of worthy candidates for inclusion in this memorial maintained by the ANA at the Colorado Springs headquarters. The bylaws now provide for the election of individuals in alternating annual cycles: in oddnumbered years, the elector panel will consider nominees from the "Modern Era" (living or deceased within 25 years of induction); in even-numbered years, those from the "Historic Era" (living or deceased more than 25 years prior to induction) will be reviewed.

Nominees need not be present or past ANA members. Nominations for the 2014 HOF induction must be submitted on official forms (available on the ANA website or by contacting Ann Rahn at (719) 482-9867) and include no less than 300 words of background or biographical information.

ANA members 18 years of age or older can submit up to two "Historic Era" nominations through Jan. 15.

Call for Service Award nominations:

ANA Service Awards is an opportunity to recognize those collectors who support and uphold the association's mission. Nominations are currently being sought for the following service awards:

Farran Zerbe Memorial — The ANA's highest honor, it is given in recognition of numerous years of outstanding, dedicated service to numismatics.

Medal of Merit — This award honors individuals who have dedicated numerous years of service to the association and promotion of the hobby.

Glenn Smedley Memorial — This award recognizes individuals who have devoted their efforts to the betterment of the ANA.

Lifetime Achievement — This award is presented to an individual, family, firm or judicial entity that has made outstanding contributions to organized numismatics.

Numismatic Art Award for Excellence in Medallic Sculpture — A lifetime achievement award.

Adna G. Wilde Award for Excellence — The award honors an ANA member who dedicates his or her time and resources to strengthen the hobby, furthers the educational mission of the ANA and sets an example for others to follow.

Harry J. Forman Dealer of the Year — The award honors a professional numismatist who shows uncommon dedication to strengthening the hobby and the ANA, and displays exemplary ethical standards as a numismatic dealer.

Exemplary Service — The award recognizes an individual or entity (club, corporation, firm or association) that has performed services on behalf of the ANA that are "above and beyond" the call.

Adult Advisor — This award is presented to an individual who has devoted their efforts to recruiting young numismatists and aiding in the development of intermediate to advanced young collectors.

Young Numismatist of the Year — This award honors young collectors for outstanding contributions to the hobby and industry.

Fort McHenry Quarter Ceremony by Simcha Kuritzky

On Sept. 13, 1814, the British Navy started their bombardment of Baltimore's Ft. McHenry. The next day, lawyer Francis Scott Key would see the giant American flag still flying over the fort and be moved to compose his famous song, which was adopted as the U.S. national anthem in 1931. On Sept. 13, the U.S. Mint held the official launch ceremonies for the America the Beautiful Ft. McHenry, Maryland, quarter at the fort site (even though the coins went on sale two weeks earlier). Members of the Maryland State Numismatic Association (MSNA) Board were on hand for the ceremony.

A gentle rain started and stopped during the first half hour of the ceremony but eventually gave way to a sunshine. There were performances by local choirs and hundreds of school children on hand. Dignitaries included Baltimore Mayor Stephanie Rawlings-Blake; U.S. Senator Ben Cardin; U.S. Representatives Dutch Ruppersberger and John Sarbanes; site Superintendent Tina Cappetta; U.S. Treasurer Rosie Rios and Mint Deputy Director Richard A. Peterson. Their speeches were occasionally punctuated by the firing of nearby cannon. Although the U.S. Mint frequently says they do not give out free samples, several hundred free quarters were given out to attendees both children and adults. There were men in early 19th Century uniforms parading cannon (see photo above) and the Treasurer poured coins into the ammo box at the end of the ceremony.

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Massachusetts/New England

New England Numismatic Association by Bob Fritsch

At the Club Rep breakfast in Rosemont, I mentioned that the New England Numismatic Association (NENA) had revived its flagging medals program.

For years, NENA had been using one of two local medal producers, Robbins Company of Attleboro, Mass., and V.H. Blackinton of Attleboro Falls, Mass. Although Robbins stopped making medals many years ago, both companies produced high-quality artistic medals for the Association. Our problem was a decline in the collector base as the membership got grayer, plus rising production costs from the manufacturer. The last medal we did with Blackinton in 2008 cost \$1,400 for the reverse die alone. That drove up unit costs which drove down sales. The Association lost money on the program and there was a distinct possibility that this would be our final medal.

The solution came from an unexpected direction. The Nashua (N.H.) Coin Club was planning to produce its 50th Anniversary medal and was looking for a manufacturer. An ad for a coin club medal from California caught our attention as it looked very nice and the cost was low. So we bought a set and found it had been produced by a challenge coin company.

We contacted them and the medal was ultimately produced in two different finishes. Cost was only \$99 per die plus around \$2.50 per piece. NENA did the same thing and have been satisfied with the results. Artwork is not as artistic as previously but the medals are "good enough."

Challenge coins have become extremely popular, not only in the numismatic world but by anyone who comes in contact with them, mainly military, police, fire and like organizations. Now coin clubs are getting into the act. NENA has been using Coins For Anything of Fredericksburg, Va. for the past four years and we intend to go on as long as we are able. Most of these companies have offices in the U.S. and production facilities overseas, mainly Korea and China, which holds down costs. Each company is pretty much the same as another and all the customer has to do is find one that fills the need. They even do colors and unusual shapes so your imagination is the only limit.

All you have to do is search for "manufacturers" and "challenge coins" on the Internet for a list of companies that make these items.

Nevada

Reno Coin Club by David Elliott, <u>datbbelliotts@prodigy.net</u> The Reno Coin Club celebrated the Great Basin National Park quarter with distribution of the coin at the Nevada State Museum on June 28, as the 1869-era coin press minted 250 silver rounds of various Nevada commemoratives.

The club is finalizing the design of its 30th anniversary medal, which will also celebrate the 150th anniversary of Nevada, to be minted during National Coin Week in April 2014. Several successful auctions have been held at the club to raise money for a die, which will be made by Medallic Arts of Dayton, Nev. Robert Vugteveen of Medallic Arts presented the "Making of Medals from Metal to Medal" at the October meeting showing both computer and handmade die production methods.



For Nevada Day, Oct. 25-26, Ken Hopple made the state's official 150th anniversary medal in silver, which can be preordered at <u>www.nevada150.org</u> for \$100.50, or in copper for \$15. The state seal is on the reverse of the medal.

The club's anniversary medal will be interesting and less expensive with a bust of Lincoln, a Morgan dollar design and the state motto, "Battle Born," in silver, brass and copper. Reverses will feature the state seal or the 1869-era coin press and CC mint mark. They will be about half the price of the official 150th anniversary medal.

New Jersey

Ocean County Coin Club by Jim Majoros

The Ocean County Coin Club was not planning to conduct its annual show in 2013 due to its home meeting location being flooded out from Hurricane Sandy. 
South Carolina

Canada

Regina Coin Club

The Regina Coin Club's fall show and sale on Oct. 19-20 featured a complete set of five Canadian 1937 brass specimen pattern coins produced at the Paris Mint. The coins, in denominations of one cent, 5 cents, 10 cents, 25 cents and 50 cents are the only known complete set in private hands. The other complete set is in the National Currency Museum at the Bank of Canada in Ottawa.

What makes these coins so special is that they are made of brass and have a "coinage axis" (coin flip) meaning the obverse and reverse go in opposite directions, like American coins. The coins are all graded as specimen coins by PCGS.

Another aspect is the provenance of the set. After the set was minted at the Paris Mint, it was purchased by King Farouk of Egypt, who had one of the largest and best coin collections in the world. After Farouk was ousted in a coup in 1953, his coin collection was sold at auction to John Pittman, who later became the president of both the ANA and CNA. The set was later purchased by Dr. John Temple, an advanced American collector. The collection now belongs to an advanced investor collector from British Columbia, who purchased it at the RCNA convention in Winnipeg in July. While the set has a value in the six figures, its owner calls the set "priceless."

Norway / Iceland

Visiting Iceland's only coin dealer. by Oddmund Fuglestad

Sigurdur Palmason is the owner of Iceland's one and only coin shop, Safnaramiðstöðin, situated at Hverfisgata 16, Reykjavik. On Sept. 5, I had the opportunity to visit Sigurdur in his nice and copious office. I was well received by Sigurdur, who is a former collector of Icelandic coins and banknotes. He informed me that he had opened the store just a few months ago. In addition to regular costumers, he is using eBay as a market place. Sigurdur emphasizes the necessity of having a real store and not just a virtual web-based store when dealing with collectors and buying and selling coins and banknotes. I couldn't agree more with that statement.

Besides a wide selection of coins and banknotes from Iceland, Sigurdur also offers an unusual selection of error coins from Iceland. Sigurdur revealed that the garbage bin at the Sedlabanki, Iceland coin packing floor now and then was misplaced.

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We also learned that the famous 2 Krónur 1966 coin with thick planchet (11.5 grams), which according to Sieg's catalogue is listed at a mintage of 300 pieces, most likely must have a higher mintage due to the fact that it was possible to produce 900 coins from each metal plate. It sure sounds likely to me.

Sigurdur also showed a book containing five different color samples for each banknote made prior to the release of the second edition banknotes. The purpose of the samples was to enable the board of directors to decide which color tone to use for the official banknotes.

Finally, I must also mention the wide selection of tokens, and especially the many different tokens from Keflavik Air Base, which caught my interest.

So, if you should visit Reykjavik, I would highly recommend visiting the shop, which is open between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. weekdays.
