Awe-Inspiring Treasures on Exhibit at World's Fair of Money®



Collectors will be able to see amazing exhibits while attending the Chicago World's Fair of Money, August 10-14. The never-before-seen \$100 million **Tyrant Collection** of U.S. type coins, including the famous King of Siam proof set that was originally presented in 1836 by the

U.S. State Department to the King of Siam (now Thailand) as a gift on behalf of President Andrew Jackson, is expected to enthrall collectors from far and wide.



History buffs also will be intrigued with the "Ship of Gold" exhibit. The 268-pound bell from the fabled SS Central America that sank in 1857 will be displayed along with some of the recovered California Gold Rush treasure. The bell that helped to confirm the identity of the historic

vessel was brought up from the Atlantic Ocean in 1988 and has not been exhibited in public for three decades. The priceless bell will be rung twice each day in remembrance of the 425 passengers and crew members who perished when the legendary ship sank 164 years ago.


California

We attended the 15th Annual Florida United Numismatists (FUN) summer convention, July 8-10, at the Orange County Convention Center in Orlando, Fla., and it was a hugely successful coin convention. We have represented the ANA at this important convention for many years. Our corner table location in the back of the bourse gave us a good view of the bourse area. We gave away many coin club publications and exonumia from the dozens of clubs we belong to and signed up 12 new or renewing members along with one life membership. We also signed up five patrons for the Chicago World's Fair of Money® and participated in the YN Treasure Hunt.

ANA National Volunteer V. Kurt Bellman, besides helping at our table and handing kids a new state quarter, donated \$25 to the ANA for shipment of the coin show kit. Besides Kurt, we were fortunate to have ANA Assistant National Coordinator Bob Mellor helping at the table. Besides ANA, 11 other coin clubs participated with tables at this convention.

We want to sincerely thank FUN Convention Coordinator Cindy Wibker, President Bob Hurst, along with the directors, for once again providing the ANA with a free table. All the FUN directors come to the show on their own dime and work extremely hard, mostly at registration with little compensation. The supporting staff also works hard for the betterment and advancement of FUN. FUN is an amazing organization and with a board like this along with other volunteers they are in good hands for decades to come.

In the outstanding official program, President Hurst said, "I would like to welcome you to the largest Summer FUN Show on record." It was that and much more. The theme was "Get Your Kicks at FUN 66." The famous U.S. Highway 66, also known as the Will Rogers Highway and the "Main Street of America," was a great theme for the convention. Like the movie *Planes, Trains and Automobiles*, everyone came to this convention by one of these modes of transportation.

Total registered public attendance for the three-day convention was 3,300 (a record), which did not include the dealer or club table holders, early birds - 104, or exhibitors. The 282 dealer tables (417 tables were set up) had 824 dealers (a record) attending them. When we came later on opening day, Cindy Wibker told us that they could not believe how long the line was for dealer registration just before the opening and President Hurst took a photo of the line.

Regarding COVID, the convention gave temperature checks before you could register. You also had to sign a liability statement protecting the show and wear a mask when entering the bourse. Besides free admission at registration, all attendees received eye glass cleaning cloths, FUN 66 medallions and a nice bag to carry those items.

The opening ceremonies featured President Hurst presenting four Presidential Awards. Receiving them were Randy Campbell, Gary Braisted, Bob Russell and Kenny Mullins. All are FUN board members except Kenny Mullins who headed the Positive Protection Inc. security team for this convention. When the door opened, it took quite a while to get the large crowd into the bourse. It was the largest opening day attendance that we can ever recall. Our table was busy for the entire day and convention with many people stopping by to say hi and others taking club publications and other exonumia we were giving away.

As for the dealers who had tables, we talked to many, and the consensus was it was the best show they have ever had. It appears that all U.S. and foreign numismatic items are selling—paper, coins or tokens and medals. Tony Swicer reported that dealers he spoke to had sales of \$35K to \$40K on Thursday alone, with one

dealer selling out of stock completely, and after buying more, sold that too. We consider the big three annual shows as ANA, FUN and CSNS. This was the largest coin show held since the ANA National Money Show in Atlanta in February 2020. Everyone was anxious for a large show and FUN obliged them nicely with a spectacular event. FUN provided coffee, tea and other food items to the dealers and others before the show opened to the public. The bourse was so large that food vendors were located outside the bourse near the entrance.

Besides the bourse, FUN featured many other activities and attractions. Tony Swicer reported four club buses sponsored by FUN, bringing 141 club members to the convention. The Ocala club had 43, West Hernando had 37, Jacksonville had 35 and Palm Beach 26. FUN is very benevolent to coin clubs with perks such as this. Exhibit Chair Bob Russell reported he had 13 exhibitors with 25 cases. His report also listed four educational programs which drew 104 attendees.

Tony Bonaro's YN program had 37 kids and his Scout Merit Badge program had 56 scouts. (Although it is too bad that the scout clinic goes so late in the day on Saturday, as most scouts did not start the treasure hunt until the bourse was almost closed and many dealers had left.) The large "Coins & Kid's" booth drew over 100 youngsters. Tony was assisted by ANA staff member Sam Gelberd and others. The "Panning for Gold" booth gave out 1,440 pans to hopeful participants. Tony finished his report by saying, "This was not a good show, it was a great show."

FUN provided numbered (60 were made) slabbed American Eagles for the exhibitors and educational speakers. All the major grading services also had tables and Wizard Coin and Book Supplies had multiple tables at the back of the show. The show also had an elevated message center. Some coin clubs also had educational programs. David Lisot had a table and his company (www.cointelevision.com) videotaped many of the highlights of the show. The Coin World table gave away their publications and had a program they were promoting called "Manage Your Collection Like Never Before." After viewing it, we think it will be very well received by every collector and dealer in the hobby. Go to www.coinworldplus.com to view it. The Greysheet also had a table and gave away the periodical Market Review. Visit www.greysheet.com for more information on this firm and their many publications. Krause Publications, though not physically at the show, sent many of their periodicals which were placed on tables outside the convention bourse.

The FUN Show Guide was great, and we love the extra added perks that are included in the program. Stories we enjoyed were, "Florida: The Nation's Summer Numismatic Playground," "22 Safety Tactics for Coin Dealers," "Customer of the Week," "What Color Was Our Currency? Not Just Green?," "Inside the Grading Room," and "Insurance: You Have Options."

It was an excellent and very active coin convention. All the FUN Board, staff members and volunteers once again did a phenomenal job of organizing and running the convention. Thank you, FUN, for your great hospitality and attention to detail. We think we covered everything on this MS70 convention; and if we missed anything we apologize. We look forward to seeing you at the 67th Annual FUN show on Jan. 6-10, 2022, at the Orange County Convention Center, for another spectacular coin convention.

We are the first non-Canadian club to win this prestigious award. We were also informed in April that back issues (1997-2016) of the *Nashua Numismatist* newsletter have been scanned onto the Newman Numismatic Portal, available at https://nnp.wustl.edu. Our outstanding newsletter continues to feature 16-20 pages of interesting coin news, items, features, pictures, and articles written by a host of members/contributors and professionally assembled by Editor Judy Blackman.

Our Coin of the Month for April was "Lincoln proof cents." We talked about all phases of this series, which started in 1909 and were issued sporadically for different reasons until consistent annual production was established in 1968.

Our May meeting featured 17 members and three guests joining us on Zoom. Our Coin of the Month topic was "Jefferson Nickels from 2006 to date" and "U.S. commemorative coins from the same period." We worked on the ANA annual National Coin Week club quiz, which included 15 tough questions about "Money, Big and Bold," this year's NCW theme. We found out later that we had once again achieved a perfect score (for the tenth straight year) and that we were lucky enough to win third prize from the drawing held among all the clubs which got them all right. We will receive a 2021 Morgan or Peace Silver Dollar.

In June, we held the first hybrid live/Zoom meeting as mentioned above and we set an attendance record because of this innovative idea. Twenty-three members and guests attended the live meeting in Gary's shop while another 13 joined us via Zoom for a total of 36 members and guests. We had a few technical glitches with the Zoom portion of the meeting, but those issues seemed to improve as the night moved on. Lessons Learned from a Hybrid Meeting

As reported by the Nashua Coin Club, we held our first hybrid meeting with both live and Zoom participants in June. Several clubs in our numismatic community are planning the same, so, to help them in their efforts, here is what we did and what we need to do.

Initially, a single computer was used, which created problems with the field of view and sound. Fortunately, two more members brought their laptops and we had three active cameras.

Lesson: Multiple computers are a must.

When all three computers had their speakers and microphones active, feedback and echo were a large problem. We quickly learned that only one set could be active at any given time and selected the computer nearest to the member speaking. It helped but was not optimal. We are looking into a wireless microphone to help solve part of the problem. Also noted was a lot of feedback from the Zoomers chatting among themselves during the break.

Lesson: One speaker/microphone at a time.

The live members could not see the Zoom participants unless they were close to one of the computers. One possible solution is use of a computer projector and a movie screen. Another is using a flat screen TV if the meeting room has one.

Lesson: The members and Zoomers need to see each other.

Show-and-tell was a mess. The camera used did not focus on close items so everyone could not see those items well. A cell phone was initially set up, but for some reason it went goofy and had to be shut off. Lesson: Get reliable close-up video.

All-in-all, it went well. Our members work together to make the club the best it can be. We listened to everyone and took their suggestions to improve the session.

Lesson: Adaptability is the key.

We got lots of feedback, especially from our Zoom participants. It proved invaluable.

Lesson: Allow everybody to participate in the process.

We are sure that each future meeting will be better than the previous one as we learn the process and vector into the best practices and procedures.





The Jewish-American Hall of Fame's website, www.amuseum.org (homepage image shown below), made its first appearance on the Internet in 1996. In 2002, it won the Numismatic Literary Guild's Best Non-Commercial Website award. In May, the newly expanded website made its debut, in time to celebrate Jewish American Heritage Month. Mel Wacks, founding director of the Jewish-American Hall of Fame, has worked for over a year to make this possible, along with programmer Sumera Manzoor.



Over 60 pages have been added, featuring large photos of the Jewish-American Hall of Fame medals and texts that are easy to read on smart phones as well as computer screens. The new pages picture medals created by renowned medalists like Eugene Daub, Alex Shagin, Marika Somogyi, Paul Vincze and Gerta Ries Wiener. Pages are easily navigable by topic, such as entertainment, military, music, science, sports, etc. Honorees range from the famous (Albert Einstein, George Gershwin, Ruth Bader Ginsburg, Houdini, et.al.) to relative unknowns (Gertrude Elion, Ernestine and "Rosie" Rosenthal). In addition to biographies, an informative and entertaining video can be viewed for virtually every inductee.

The old website, containing a "Virtual Tour Through 500 Years of Jewish American History," quizzes, the "Harry Flower Collection of Einstein Medals," etc., has been kept intact and accessible in the archives section of the revamped website. In addition, several books can be read on the website: *The Handbook of Biblical Numismatics* and *Medals of the Jewish-American Hall of Fame* by Mel Wacks, and *Antisemitic Bigotry on Historic Medals* by Dr. Benjamin Weiss.

Mel Wacks says, "You can spend hours walking virtually around the halls of the Jewish-American Hall of Fame and enjoy viewing masterpieces of medallic art, and learning about outstanding individuals and historic events, who you may or may not have ever heard of." Wacks also invites everyone who would like to see the physical exhibit of Jewish-American Hall of Fame plaques, to visit the Virginia Holocaust Museum in Richmond.
