Heath Society Established to Create Innovative Educational Opportunities for New Audiences

The American Numismatic Association is introducing the Heath Society, a leadership giving program that recognizes individuals and families who contribute \$10,000 or more annually. Named for visionary ANA Founder Dr. George F. Heath, the Heath Society will work to connect with millions of people the ANA has not had the chance to reach and create programming for a national numismatic experience.

Included in the Heath Society's vision is support for innovative learning opportunities through the Dwight N. Manley Numismatic Library, the Edward C. Rochette Money Museum, and two new museum campuses scheduled to open in Washington, D.C., and San Francisco.

Donald H. Kagin, Ph.D., member of the ANA Board of Governors and head of its Education Committee, became a founding member of the Heath Society.

"I am joining the Heath Society because I want to assure that visitors to ANA museums in San Francisco, Washington, D.C., and Colorado Springs experience numismatics in a way that will inspire them long after their tour is complete," Kagin said. "It takes money to create the innovative programming to reach the millions of new collectors I know are out there. I hope others will follow my example and help us transform the ANA and build the numismatic community."

The Heath Society follows the success of the 1891 Alliance, a giving program founded two years ago and aimed at continuing the organization's educational legacy. Beginning with the 2007-08 year, Alliance members' annual donations of \$1,891 will be used exclusively to attract, educate and inspire young collectors and hobbyists to expand and build the numismatic community.
