See the sights of The Freedom Trail, including the Old State House (scene of the Boston Massacre) the U.S.S. *Constitution*, Faneuil Hall and the Old North Church. Lunch at Quincy Market.

Sunday, August 15, 9:15 a.m.-1:30 p.m. (\$60 through July 1; \$70 after)

Enjoy a 3-hour cruise as you look for humpback, minke or finback whales aboard a high-speed, whale-watching catamaran. The trip in and out of the historic harbor also offers wonderful views of Boston.

The World's Fair of Money is the nation's premiere money show. The event features more than 1,100 numismatic dealers; the ANA Museum Showcase exhibiting some of the world's most valuable and beautiful coins and paper money; a Mint Promenade with mints from around the world; the Collector Exhibits area; a multi-million-dollar auction by Heritage Auction Galleries; hourly educational presentations and seminars; and special events including the ANA's annual awards banquet.

Show hours are 2:00-5:30 p.m. August 10, and 9:30-5:30 p.m. August 11-14. Dealer set-up is from 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. on Tuesday, August 10.
