DR Program Overhaul

District Representatives (DRs) provide an essential link between clubs and the ANA. The program is a volunteer effort managed by volunteers. DRs provide services in the form of outreach packages for shows, information on educational opportunities, YN supplies, lesson plans and membership services. They also attend club coin shows and provide ANA information. ANA President Tom Uram appointed Phil Vitale as the ANA outreach programs coordinator at the August 2023 World's Fair of Money®. This position manages the DR program and coordinates membership activities.

Over the past several years, the DR program effectiveness has eroded due to personnel shifts, the COVID pandemic, and reliance on the ANA staff that was engaged in higher priorities. The effect has been to lose touch with the 80-plus DRs. We were unable to tell which DRs were still active, which clubs were supported, and which clubs were not. Phil has been having DR meetings around the country to re-establish communications and understand what may be limiting program effectiveness.

Our immediate objective is to make the DR job easier. We are looking at processes to streamline and perhaps eliminate. Thus far we have eliminated quarterly reporting, are providing name tags and business cards, and, as a result of a generous donation by Dr. Mike Fuljenz, will be offering ANA tablecloths for DRs to use at club coin shows. We hope to limit the number of clubs supported by a DR to four and look to support some "missionary" work to non-ANA clubs in the future. Another objective will be to re-establish the club representative approach to enable DRs to pass information more effectively. We are also looking to provide DRs with short presentations to use with clubs to enhance recruiting and keep members up to speed with ongoing and new initiatives.

Exquisite Rarities on Display at the 2024 World's Fair of Money® in Chicago

The ANA's Edward C. Rochette Money Museum will feature rare and historic items during the World's Fair of Money, Aug. 6-10, in Rosemont, Ill. Exhibits will comprise numismatic treasures from the museum collection and from private collections. Here are some of the exhibits you can expect to see this year:

• Two Extraordinarily Rare U.S. Pattern Sets from the Black Cat Collection – this includes the only remaining complete 16-coin 1868 Aluminum Die Trial Proof Set (the only set still intact) and the complete proof set of 1882 Liberty Head Shield Earring coins in copper and silver.



 1913 Liberty Head Nickel – no one is sure how or why the five known 1913 pieces were produced. Over the years, the "fab five" have become some of the world's most valuable coins and have consistently been among the price leaders in the numismatic market.



• The First U.S. Cents – Starting with the Fugio cents of 1787, this exhibit features the first cents produced for the United States, all from the 18th century. These rare early coins illustrate the evolution of the earliest images of Liberty on American coins. The objects from this exhibit have been generously loaned by Ron Firman.



 Bank of United States Notes – Highlights from a recent donation to the Edward C. Rochette Money Museum by ANA Life Members John and Nancy Wilson of Bank of the United States obsolete banknotes. This extensive collection includes checks signed by President Andrew Jackson and General Winfield Scott.



• Parthia; The Forgotten Empire – Parthia was one of the great empires of the Middle East – centered on modern Iran and Iraq – and the only civilized empire that managed not only to survive contact with the expanding Roman Empire but even defeat it on multiple occasions. Yet it is largely neglected in the history books despite almost 500 years of existence and having a long numismatic history.



We want to thank General Chair Wade Harrell, President Richard Selvar, and the Ocala Coin Club officers and members for the free ANA table. With gold (digital) ANA membership reduced to \$5 we were able to sign up 19 new or renewing members. We also gave out copies of *The Numismatist*, other coin literature, and coin books along with other numismatic items from the ANA or our collection. Over 975 individuals attended, including 83 youth with families, many of whom were first-time attendees, according to Jason Ewell, club president and show chairman.

As to the 2024 phenomenal record attendance, President Ewell commented: "We increased our dealer bourse three-fold to 60-plus dealers with over 100 tables and added another first—an ANACS on-site booth. We heavily invested in advertising this year's event and special youth activities online through numerous social media outlets and platforms which paid off handsomely!"

Jason added, "the bourse floor business was nonstop action all three days, with overall dealer sales far exceeding expectations. Dealer Roger of Zia Enterprises, commented that his Friday sales alone paid for all his show and travel expenses ... with Saturday and Sunday revenues being a big bonus, just pure gravy!"

On the youth outreach activities, Jason noted, "we were again honored and grateful to have ANA Past President and youth activities guru-educator Walt Ostromecki on-site again to handle 'THE YOUTH AND FAMILY COIN EXPERIENCE HANDS-ON LEARNING ZONE,' which featured numerous exciting numismatic learning experiences, along with a twelve-stop Coin Treasure Trivia Hunt. He comes at his own expense and provides all the coin hunt treasures as a means of giving back to our beloved hobby and attracting current non-collector youngsters, families and adults into our fraternity and local coin club."

"Ostromecki's coin hunt program is both designed as a fun and exciting learning activity for kids to spark their interest in the coin hobby, while building a starter coin collection or adding to one," said Jason. "He accomplishes this numismatic feat by attaching coins in '2x2s' to information cards. Some examples all youth went home with include: a WWII 35% silver nickel; a silver Mercury Dime; an Ike Dollar; and the latest 2024 -P American Women Quarter Series. A record 83 youth completed the 2024 Treasure Hunt."

"The other youth-focused event at the show on Saturday was our club's sponsored annual youth auction which was well attended by over 50 youngsters, which included nine cub scouts. A total of 71 lots were eagerly grabbed up by bidders given scrip," concluded Jason.

The show also had twelve educational exhibits on various collecting interests. The public did all the voting for first, second and third place displays. First place by a hair went to Rod Frechette of the Albuquerque Coin Club—ANA's 2022 Numismatist of the Year.

Since becoming involved with the Representative Program in 1988, my table(s) at local coin club shows have evolved from just the American Numismatic Association (ANA) into a 'combination table,' offering much more, along with The Numismatist and assorted ANA literature. First, Youth: Thanks to generous support from the Northern California Numismatic Association (NCNA) and other sources, youngsters swinging by can receive a magnifier with lanyard, foreign coins and currency, and even used stamps. Second, Stamps: Over the decades, there have been inquiries about stamps and stamp collecting, usually the consequences of a passing comment like 'my late dad collected stamps;' so, at my 'combination table,' there is literature courtesy of the American Philatelic Society (APS). Third, Hobby Information: Also spread out are flyers for neighboring local coin shows, always an inquiry, as well as informative numismatic literature courtesy of the Professional Numismatic Guild (PNG). Lastly, Answering Questions: I have learned to answer diverse questions, from the perennial 'what is this worth?' or 'what dealer has Chinese Cash or Silver Dollars?' or 'where is the restroom?' (Yes, That Is An Imperative, LOL!) or 'can you identify this coin or coins?' or 'what or who or where is a local coin club' or 'the closest ATM or Chinese buffet?' The latter are regular questions—must be some passion for Chinese food and for more cash, LOL!

While the obligation is to the ANA, and rightly so, the reality for someone venturing into his or her first coin show, alone or with an accumulation, their respective need is more than ANA recruiting. They need answers, directions, or suggestions.

My Approach Is Simple: If someone is helped, then our 'world of money' wins, as any old sailor can remark, 'Tides Rise All Ships.'

Sidebar: At these 'combination tables,' I also do IKE's For As and JFK's For Bs, rewarding exemplary academic success: an IKE for every A grade and a JFK for every B grade. A youngster stops and shares his most recent report card and goes away with two coins rarely seen nowadays along with his quite proud accompanying adult or parent, sometimes even a grandparent.
