# \$100 Million in Rare Coins to Captivate the Public in Phoenix

Who says a penny isn't worth much these days? The public can see a legendary Lincoln cent valued at more than \$1 million, along with more than \$100 million of other historic rare coins and paper money, at the National Money Show® (NationalMoneyShow.com) in the Phoenix Convention Center, March 2-4. Visitors also can find out what their old coins and currency may be worth.

The convention, which is expected to draw thousands of collectors from across the country, will feature hundreds of dealers eager to buy, sell and appraise coins and currency; a pre-convention seminar on counterfeit detection; lectures and presentations from noted collecting professionals, an online auction by <a href="Classical Numismatic Group">Classical Numismatic Group</a> (CNG), incredible museum-quality exhibits and more.

#### **Schedule**

The convention, located in Hall F of the Phoenix Convention Center, is open 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Saturday, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Last entry is 30 minutes prior to closing. Registration is \$10. Children 12 and under, as well as active duty and retired military personnel with valid ID (and up to three guests), are admitted free of charge. Entry is free for everyone on Saturday.

## **Amazing Exhibits**

Coins valued in the millions – such as a \$3 million nickel – and seldom-seen historical exhibits from the ANA's **Money Museum** and treasures from private collections are a huge draw for the public. Among the rarities on display:

- The first Arizona appearance of a mis-made World War II Lincoln cent that sold for more than \$1 million. This penny still has the original mint red color 80 years after it left the Philadelphia Mint.
- One of the five known 1913-dated Liberty Head nickels. It is one of the world's most famous rare coins and is insured today for \$3 million.
- Two-centuries-old medals honoring President George Washington.
- Rare examples of the United States dimes from 1796 and 1797.
- Fascinating "funny money," United
   States bills mistakenly printed with
   various errors, such as upside down or
   missing serial numbers.
- Historic World War II "Short Snorter" display, featuring banknotes autographed by U.S. Presidents Herbert Hoover, Franklin D. Roosevelt and Dwight D. Eisenhower.
