Have a say in the future of the ANA

Nominations are currently being sought for the 2015 American Numismatic Association Board of Governors election. ANA bylaws require nominees to secure the physical signatures of 25 ANA members, 25 ANA-member clubs in good standing, or a combination of the two in order to be placed on the ballot.

Members of the Board of Governors are elected for two-year terms. The ANA's Congressional Charter rests control of the association with the board members.

All nine members' terms are expiring this summer, and the new board will be installed at the World's Fair of Money in Chicago on Aug. 14, 2015.

Nomination forms, a timeline for the election, the ANA bylaws, eligibility for office, and all other information pertaining to the elections can be downloaded at the ANA Election Center: <u>http://www.money.org/elections</u>.

Members will also have the opportunity to vote electronically or with a traditional paper ballot received via U.S. mail. Members who do not opt-in for the electronic ballot will instead receive a paper ballot.

Please take a moment and follow the steps below to receive an electronic ballot, or to see if you're already signed up for the electronic ballot. Members who signed up for electronic ballots in the 2013 Election will receive an electronic ballot unless they follow the steps below and uncheck the Electronic Ballot box.

- 1. Log in to money.org
- 2. On the yellow menu bar, hover over "My ANA" and select "My Account."
- 3. Click on "Update my Information."
- 4. Scroll down to the "ANA Benefits" area of the screen and check the box labeled "Electronic Ballot" in order to vote electronically.





Made on Old Press #1 dating to 1869, the medal featured Lincoln, the state of Nevada and the old coin press. The club was able to buy a new projector and screen from the proceeds.



Specialty Clubs

Carson City Coin Collectors of America

The fall-winter 2014 issue of *Curry's Chronicle*, the award-winning journal of the Carson City Coin Collectors of America, treats member-readers to a fascinating story of how David Sundman of Littleton Coin Co. found an 1870-CC half dollar that was struck on the canceled die he's owned for a decade. Other articles include a recap of the club's regional meeting, a book review, personal collecting experiences, and an array of helpful information about Carson City coins.



"C" for Carson City

The side of this die is stamped with "C" for Carson City (the Charlotte, NC Mint had closed in 1861). Because the main mint at Philadelphia made all of the dies for branch mints, this letter made it easy to identify the particular die to ship to the respective mints.

Mary Elise Arnold's article, "A Review of the 2014 C4OA Regional Meeting – Carson City, Nevada"

provides an entertaining summary of events at the C4OA regional meeting in Carson City, Nev.

In a second article, "The Chopmark Challenge in Carson City Coinage," Mary Elise Arnold shares her journey of acquiring a special, chopmarked 1874-CC Trade dollar to add to her distinctive collection.

Mary Elise's father, Tony Arnold, also contributed an article, "The Eagle Street Mint – Where Carson City \$10 Gold Pieces Began Their Ascent," in which he tells why the \$10 eagle is his favorite "CC" denomination in the gold coin category. Tony Arnold's influence also instigated club member Bill Dunn's latest obsession, which he vividly describes in his submission "'Just One Look, That's All It Took ...' – Building a Grade Set of Circulated 1885-CC Morgan Silver Dollars."

Weimar White's 43rd contribution to *Curry's Chronicle* since its inception in summer 2005, explains why assembling a 10-piece Carson City coin type set in Mint State condition is very difficult.

Peter Plath's article recounts how surprised he was when he received a special plaque from PCGS honoring him for his 56-piece (out of a possible 57 pieces) set of certified Carson City gold coins.

Mark Archambault's essay reminds readers to remain patient when on the quest for their next coin purchase, as he did before buying the 1872-CC half dollar for his Loosechange Collection.

Wendy Beattie, senior copywriter at Littleton Coin Company, penned the aforementioned narrative about David Sundman's (her boss), unique, lightly-canceled 1870-CC half dollar die, and his discovery of a coin struck on it.

Tom DeFina, whose word-search puzzles are popular features in Curry's Chronicle, chose as his theme in this issue's installment "A Comstock Curiosity (of Mine) – The Bowers Mansion."

James Sneddon's article, "A Rare Find – A Countermarked 1889-CC Morgan Silver Dollar," describes a one-of-a-kind coin he recently acquired.

Club president Rusty Goe reviews Nevada historian Jack Harpster's book about the life of a famous coin-hoarder, which is entitled The Curious Life of Nevada's LaVere Redfield: The Silver Dollar King. In Goe's second article, "Are there Any Hindrances to Free-Market Prices for Carson City Coins?," he makes a case that Carson City coins trade in a free-market system, which allows true-value prices realized.

Hundreds of students visit Money Museum in 2014

"Our History of Money exhibit, in our permanent gallery, allows students to make a connection with the curriculum they are currently studying regardless of their age, because it reaches across the time span of a few thousand years. They usually find something they can relate to in one form or another."
