Third Annual California Numismatic Seminar by Michael S. Turrini

On Saturday, Sept. 17, in Vallejo, Calif., the Northern California Numismatic Association (NCNA) sponsored its Third Annual California Numismatic Seminar, with the theme "The Future of Our Hobby (or Hobbies)."

Four qualified coin and hobby celebrants shared and exchanged their respective insights and observations. Four diverse programs were presented and speakers responding to questions from more than 60 attendees, several novice to the hobby or just curious, including one driving from Seattle.

The first presenter was the energized and enthused Executive Director of the American Philatelic Society (APS), Scott D. English. Young and experienced in Washington, D.C. and state service, Scott began with the candid conclusion that "we are victims of what we are," and further, there are real similarities between stamps and coins, and the two should "work together, for it is not what you collect but that you do collect."

Admitting the aging population and other issues confront both the APS and ANA, Scott stated the hobbies need a much more proactive Internet/web presence, need to collaborate and to coordinate, and have their national leadership and professional staffs actively engaged into the grassroots of our hobbies. His presence at this year's seminar was confirmation of that approach.

Following Scott's presentation was Stephen P. Woodland, from Canada and a devoted Royal Canadian Numismatic Association member, whose emphasis was technology and demographics. Steve believes that numismatics suffers from "failure to adapt" — not adopting and implementing changing technologies.

He noted that one of the major Canadian national coin shows is a joint coin and stamp venture, and is successful. Continuing, via technology, Steve offered that numismatics can engage "Generations X and Y plus Millennials." Instagram and other social media were specifically advocated.

Intense in his opinions, Steve argued that corporate sponsors and celebrity endorsements are needed and need to be solicited. The primary recruitment age group should be 35 to 45 year-olds, with local coin clubs offering daycare to attract families to local coin shows.

After a lunch break, Charmy Harker, "The Penny Lady," came on strong for "women in numismatics." Her primary message was "become a mentor," and she reflected on her own personal experiences.

Charmy proposed that more video education be created and shared, and that real school and educational curricula be developed and implemented. She also supported day care availability.

Based on her professional experience, she noted that the commercial aspect of numismatics, the buying and selling, has advanced significantly with improved and sharply detailed photography on the Internet. She believes that this has furthered the trading of higher value coins via the Internet.

Continuing the above point, Charmy argued that good professional photography is imperative for numismatic websites, and those websites need to be easily searchable, sortable, and sizable.

Concluding the four presenters was Jeff Shevlin, a former ANA Executive Director, whose call was "action."

Echoing much of the three prior presenters, Jeff engaged the audience and solicited not just ideas but "what could you do for our hobby," even getting actual commitments and pledges from some present.

Some ideas were as simple as bringing a guest to a local coin club, or more expansive as in writing something for a local coin club newsletter. Like the other presenters, Jeff reviewed statistics and facts; yet, he intensely argued that those can be refuted and replaced with real commitments at the grassroots level of our hobby.

In the concluding panel discussion, all presenters united with three specifics: *one*, the hobby, both hobbies, need to adapt and to adjust; *two*, demographics and changing populations are an issue that must be addressed; and *three*, least it is forgotten, numismatics and philately must be fun.

Two positives emanated from this all-day seminar: first, Scott and Steve plan to collaborate and to communicate regularly, sharing ideas and resources; and two, efforts need to begin at the local level for sharing and joining between coins and stamps.

In addition, it is hoped that at the national level, the ANA and APS will partner and open lines of communication. Further, all four presenters expressed a willingness to return and to progress the dialogue.

Written evaluations afterwards from attendees shared the common conclusion that the seminar was a success and was a start toward a much better understanding of our hobbies and what the future might be, whether coins or stamps.

Looking to 2017, NCNA has tentatively scheduled Saturday, Sept. 16, 2017 for the Third Annual California Numismatic Seminar, with a theme grown from this year's seminar, "Collecting In Today's World." The show was held at the beautiful Hawaii Convention Center in the Maui Ballroom (carpeted and well lit) on Sept. 23-25. The theme for this year's show was, "Pearl Harbor 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Commemoration."

The show featured a 60-dealer bourse with over 75 dealers from Hawaii and the mainland. Registered public attendance was 1,100 for the three-day event. Admission is always free at this coin show and parking is only \$10. Coffee and donuts were provided daily for the dealers and coin show workers. The club members manage public and dealer registration, the coin club table, and set up and break down the show. The Honolulu Police Department handled the security, which was excellent.

Before the show started 100 HSNA-overprinted FRNs were placed in circulation in Oahu. The first three returned at the show received \$500, \$200 and \$100 gift certificates, respectively, for redemption at the show. Dave Harper, editor of *Numismatic News*, had an excellent blog on this promotional effort by HSNA (http://www.numismaticnews.net/buzz/hawaiisidea-spread). The show featured hourly door prize drawings for both adults and juniors, which is always very popular. Past ANA vice president Patti Finner held Boy Scout Coin Collecting Merit Badge clinics on Saturday and Sunday. Over both days 25 Scouts, including one Cub Scout, received merit badges. Patti also handled the YN table, which always has great numismatic items for the juniors.

Two very interesting limited edition collectibles (individually numbered 1 to 100) were produced for the show by club member Michael Mochizuki. The first was a six-coin elongated type set (1941 cent, 2016 cent, nickel, dime, Hawaii State Quarter and U.S.S. Arizona medallion). The second was an encased three-coin set (1941 cent, 1943 steel cent and 2016 cent) commemorating the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Pearl Harbor. Both sets sold for \$15 each and information on the events was included with each set.

A limited edition commemorative Panda issue was produced by the China Mint, and featured HSNA – 2016 on the packaging. They were limited to one per person and three to the dealers who had tables. Well-prepared numismatic exhibits were also part of the show. Everyone who attended the show received a special elongated coin featuring the U.S.S. Arizona Memorial. They ran out of these elongated coins.

Our ANA table was located in the bourse area and the flow of traffic was steady. We signed up 20 new members for the Association. Many of the dealers still were set up and dealing after the closing hour of the show on Sunday. On Sunday afternoon we also ran out of *The Numismatist* and many other items we brought for the show. A special thank you to dealer Coleman Foster from Austin, Texas, for his \$100 donation to the ANA for the shipment of the coin show kit.

Honolulu is a fabulous location to have a coin show or just to visit. Great weather, tons of things to do, Waikiki beach, Pearl Harbor, Polynesian Village, reasonable to moderately priced hotels, many nearby restaurants and the huge three-level Ala Moana Shopping Center three blocks away. 
