American Numismatic Association Museum Rarities on Display at 2024 National Money Show®

It won't cost a cent in admission to see millions of dollars of historic rare coins and paper money during the American Numismatic Association (ANA) National Money Show (NationalMoneyShow.com) at the iconic Broadmoor resort in Colorado Springs, Colo., March 14-16, 2024. Admission is free.

"Important coins and early U.S. bank notes from the ANA's Edward C. Rochette Money Museum will be on display at the show, including a spectacular exhibit of the first one-cent denomination coins of the United States. Items range from the Fugio cent of 1787 to the United States Mint's earliest issues including the large Liberty Head cents struck from 1793 to 1799," said Thomas J. Uram, president of the 26,000-member ANA.

"We'll also have a display of Colorado currency featuring a selection of early Colorado National Bank notes along with a set of the famous Leshner dollars created by silver mine owner Joseph Leshner in the mining town of Victor, Colo., in the Cripple Creek mining district," explained Doug Mudd, director and curator of the Money Museum.

Other Money Museum rarities on display at the show will be one of the approximately 40 known surviving 1933 Eagles (\$10 denomination gold coin) designed by acclaimed sculptor Augustus Saint-Gaudens. Another

exceptional exhibit is of a 1943 Lincoln cent mistakenly struck in copper/bronze alloy that still has its original mint red color 81 years after it left the Philadelphia Mint, and a 1944 cent struck on a zinc-coated steel planchet intended only for 1943 cents. *See page 3 for sample photos.*

"The ANA Colorado Springs National Money Show will provide collectors access to hundreds of dealers offering extensive numismatic inventory at all price levels as well as educational programming for both beginning and seasoned hobbyists," explained ANA Executive Director Kim Kiick.

The three-day event will be held in Bartolin Hall at The Broadmoor, 1 Lake Ave. in Colorado Springs. Public hours are Thursday and Friday, March 14 and 15 from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Saturday, March 16, from 10 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

The ANA has negotiated discount room rates for attendees starting at \$209 per night. In addition, the usual daily resort fee of \$32 per room will be waived, and overnight guests will get complimentary self-parking and free in-room internet service. Reservations must be made by February 3 to get the special room rate.

New Museum Gallery to be Unveiled During Special National Money Show® Reception

On Thursday, March 14, the ANA previews its newest exhibit at the Edward C. Rochette Money Museum during a special reception, 6-7:30 p.m. The ANA Philanthropy Award will also be presented during the event. Refreshments and light hors d'oeuvres will be served.

The Americana Gallery Exhibit emphasizes iconic rarities of American numismatics, such as the 1933 eagle (gold \$10); a rare 1855 Wass, Molitor & Company \$50 California Territorial Gold piece; and a beautiful set of 1915 Panama Pacific Exposition commemoratives. Rare uncut paper money sheets from the famous Aubrey and Adeline Bebee collections also will be on display, as will selections from the Baker-Manley collection of Washing-

ton medals, and federal and territorial gold coinage from the recent Carlson Chambliss donation.

Shuttles to and from The Broadmoor are available. Advanced registration for the museum reception and the shuttle is required. **RSVP online by February 16 or by phone (719) 482-9856 or email rsvp@money.org**. Overflow parking is available at the Colorado Springs Fine Arts Center at Colorado College (next door to the Money Museum).

Summer Seminar Scholarships Available – Application Deadline Extended

The ANA is accepting scholarship applications for its 2024 Summer Seminar, the hobby's premier educational event. Recipients will have the opportunity to attend one of two weeklong sessions, to be held June 16-19 and June 23-26 on the Colorado College campus adjacent to ANA headquarters in Colorado Springs, Colorado. All members – adults and Young Numismatists (YNs) – are eligible.

Several different scholarships are available – the ANA Young Numismatist Scholarship, the Robert C. Lecce Advanced Scholarship, the Charles O. Browne Scholarship, and the Greg Lyon Memorial Young Numismatist Scholarship.

Full scholarships for both YNs and adults include room and board for one week, tuition, and airfare, while partial scholarships for all applicants cover tuition only. Recipients will be selected based on need and merit.

California

Northern California Joint Forum

The California State Numismatic Association (CSNA) and the Northern California Numismatic Association (NCNA) hosted the Northern California Numismatic Educational Joint Forum on Saturday, Nov. 18, at the Vallejo Naval and Historical Museum in Vallejo, Calif.

While it rained, nothing dampened the success and spirit within the Museum's Hall of History, as about 60 attendees enjoyed the full day of four presentations.

- Marina Fischer, Collection Specialist for Numismatics at the Nickle Galleries, University of Calgary (Calgary, Alberta) interrupted her curating and lecturing duties and enjoyed a few days in northern California, guest of CSNA and NCNA. She presented on the "Imperial Roman Coinage of Augustus Caesar," and its influences on coinage thereafter. She noted that coinages of Augustus Caesar were to convey a message to the public, and Augustus was quite effective with this over his reign as the first emperor.
- Noted Mexican numismatic scholar, Jose Raul Ramirez, spoke on "Reales To Pesos," showing the evolution of Mexican coinage. His presentation displayed the evolutionary changes in Mexican large size coins from the Colonial/Spanish Era through the 1800s and ending with recent modern issues.

- Coupled with Ms. Fischer's presentation, 'Doctor' Lloyd G. Chan, who is well-known among Canadian coin hobbyists, talked about "Alexander The Great: His Coins." His presentation also reflected the influences of Alexander The Great's coinage as well as the purposes and messages minted on ancient coins, such as religious or civic pride.
- There was one change: Kyle M. Anderson, of Concord, Calif., and an avid scouter, plus outgoing Diablo Numismatic Society president, stepped up to the plate replacing the originally intended talk. His topic was "Hawaiian Numismatics," covering the whole realm of Hawaiian coins and currency, plus tokens, such as pineapple plantation tokens.

The Joint Forum is an annual educational symposium partnered with CSNA and NCNA, the latter the primary funding support, adhering to the educational objectives of the two associations. Michael S. Turrini was the event's coordinator and inviter for the four presenters. CAFNE, Canadian Association For Numismatic Education, also provided some assistance.

A welcome greeting from the City of Vallejo's mayor added to the event, and a simple on-site lunch service had attendees meeting and mingling.

The next Northern California Joint Forum will be on Saturday, Nov. 16, 2024, returning to the Vallejo Naval and Historical Museum.

Canada

Regina Coin Club

George Manz is Regina Coin Club president and Fellow of the Royal Canadian Numismatic Association.

The Canadian government established the Bank of Canada in 1934. The bank opened its doors on March 11, 1935.

The government decided that the policy of allowing the chartered banks to issue their own notes should be replaced by bank notes issued by the new Bank of Canada. The new bank notes would also replace the old large “horse blanket” notes that were issued by the Dominion of Canada as far back as 1870.

In addition, the chartered banks were only allowed to issue their own notes until January 1, 1945 and only if they were the same size as the new 1935 Bank of Canada notes. The Royal Bank of Canada issued the last Chartered Bank note, a \$5 note, in 1943.

The Bank of Canada issued its first notes in 1935 in a series of unilingual English and French notes, each 6 inches by 2 7/8 inches. These smaller notes saved expensive bank note paper as well as ink, so they were cheaper to produce than their larger older cousins. The notes are made of 75% linen and 25% cotton.

The Bank issued the notes in \$1, \$2, \$5, \$10, \$20, \$25, \$50, \$100, \$500 and \$1,000 denominations. Most of the French notes were sent to Quebec, while a smaller number were sent to other parts of Canada.

And what notes they were. The notes from \$1 - \$100 depicted members of the Royal Family. The \$1 pictures King George V, the \$2 showed Queen Mary, the \$5 The Prince of Wales (soon to become King Edward VIII), the \$10 Princess Mary, the \$20 features Princess Elizabeth (the future Queen Elizabeth II), the \$50 showed Prince Albert (soon to become King George VI), while the \$100 represents Prince Henry.

The backs of all the notes except for the \$25 note portray allegorical scenes such as agriculture, transportation, modern inventions, commerce and industry.



The \$25 note (above) was the first commemorative Bank of Canada issue. It celebrated the 25th Anniver-

sary of King George V. The note portrays the King & Queen on their Silver Jubilee. It is the only 1935 issue with two portraits, with the monarchs in the centre of the note, while the other denominations have the portraits on the left. The back of the \$25 note, instead of an allegory, depicts Windsor Castle. It is the only \$25 note ever issued by the Bank of Canada.



The \$500 note (above) portrayed Sir John A. Macdonald, the first Prime Minister of Canada, while the \$1,000 note represents Sir Wilfred Laurier, another well-known Prime Minister.

All the notes used the signatures of Deputy Governor J.A.C. Osborne on the left, while the signature of Governor G.F. Towers is on the right.

The \$500 notes are extremely rare. Not only was \$500 a lot of money during the Great Depression, the Bank of Canada also made very few of them. Most were recalled and destroyed by the Bank of Canada soon after they were issued. Only 40 \$500 notes are outstanding and only a handful of these still exist.

The most valuable Canadian bank note sold at auction in 2023 was a 1935 \$500 English note graded AU-53 by Legacy Currency Grading. It sold for C\$432,000. Another Legacy note graded VF-20 sold for C\$177,750, while a PMG VF-25 sold for \$237,000.

A complete set of 1935 notes in English will be on display at the Regina Coin Club Spring Show. They are from the collection of a long-time Regina Coin Club member. This gentleman does not have the \$500 in his collection, so another member of the Regina Coin Club will display his Proof 1935 \$500 English Face and Back notes. The notes are graded by Legacy and grade Superb Gem New-68 PPQ and Superb Gem New-67 PPQ. Both are mounted on cardstock.

On January 20, 1936, King George V died of pneumonia. His eldest son, David, assumed the throne as King Edward VIII. He abdicated on December 11, 1936 because he wanted to marry an American divorcee, an act that was not allowed by the Church of England.

His younger brother took his place on December 11, 1936 and became known as King George VI.

It was the year of three kings, but only two of the monarchs had notes issued in their name: George V and George VI.

Because the Bank of Canada issued new banknotes in 1937, depicting George VI, the older but still recent issues of 1935 were quickly retired, resulting in their scarcity.

The display will be one of several at the Regina Coin Club Spring Show, April 20-21, at the Italian Club, 2148 Connaught Street in Regina.
